Dear Mr. Konieczny and the Amcor Plc Leadership Team,

We write to you as [B4Ukraine](#), a coalition of Ukrainian and international civil society organizations committed to curbing the financial support that fuels Russia's brutal invasion of Ukraine. We are writing to raise concerns about media and industry reports suggesting that [Amcor returned](#) to the Russian market following the company's previous exit. We are seeking clarification regarding Amcor Plc's (Amcor's) current policies and oversight mechanisms in this regard.

**We call on [Amcor](#) to:**

- Immediately cease operations and completely exit the Russian market.
- Refrain from any future business, trade, or investment in Russia until Russia ends its war against Ukraine, territorial integrity of Ukraine is restored, and accountability imposed for war crimes and the destruction of Ukrainian infrastructure and property.
- Ensure that any re-engagement with the Russian market occurs only after all of the following conditions are met:
  - Ukraine's sovereignty and complete territorial integrity are restored, as recognized by international law.
  - Reparations are paid in full for all damages caused by Russian aggression, covering infrastructure, economic losses, and human suffering.
  - Accountability is imposed for violations of international law, including the crime of aggression, war crimes, and crimes against humanity.

Following the full-scale invasion of Ukraine, Amcor has decided to suspend its operations in the Russian Federation and subsequently divest its local manufacturing assets, completing the [sale of its three Russian factories](#) in December 2022. The company stated that this decision reflected the significant geopolitical and economic uncertainty created by the war, and it formally exited the Russian market by transferring ownership of its facilities and discontinuing direct business activities in the country.

In 2026, multiple media outlets reported that Amcor may be indirectly supplying packaging products into Russia years after its 2022 exit. According to an article in EU Reporter, local Russian media claimed that Amcor packaging is being [supplied to Russian](#) fast-moving consumer goods companies through a new intermediary named ROTI LLC, registered in November 2025, with shipments allegedly originating from Amcor production facilities in China, Thailand and the Czech Republic. A [Russian economic commentary](#) similarly observed that, while Amcor formally left the Russian market in 2022, it appeared "to be seeking customers in Russia" under the ROTI LLC banner, offering products sourced from outside Russia. We understand that Amcor has not issued any official statements regarding the matter.

We acknowledge Amcor's initial exit from the Russia. However, we are **deeply concerned by recent reports indicating that the company has returned to the Russian market.** In light of these developments, we are therefore writing to seek **clarification regarding Amcor's current activities, policies, and oversight arrangements related to Russia.**

In particular, we request information on Amcor's enhanced oversight and transparency measures to ensure that none of its products, technologies, or commercial activities, whether directly or indirectly, continue to contribute to Russia's war economy. This includes details on heightened human rights due diligence procedures, strengthened supply chain due diligence and oversight, effective oversight of subsidiaries and distributors, and transparent measures implemented to prevent Amcor's products from supporting Russia's military or war-time economy.

**In light of the above, we are writing to ask Amcor to clarify the following:**

- Can Amcor clarify whether the resumption of sales or distribution of Amcor products in Russia has been authorized or approved by the company, including through subsidiaries, business partners, or other commercial relationships, and how this aligns with Amcor's human rights policy commitment under the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights?
- What are Amcor's current intentions and governance arrangements with respect to its alleged presence in the Russian market?
- How has Amcor identified, assessed, and prioritized the heightened human rights risks associated with renewed commercial activity in Russia, particularly in the context of an ongoing armed conflict characterized by widespread and well-documented human rights abuses?
- What enhanced human rights and supply-chain due diligence measures has Amcor implemented, in line with UNGPs 17–21, to prevent, mitigate, and account for how it addresses the risk that its products, technologies, or services may contribute, directly or indirectly, to Russia's war effort or war-time economy?
- How does Amcor exercise and increase its leverage over subsidiaries, distributors, and other business partners in or connected to Russia to ensure effective supply chain controls, prevent diversion or misuse, and ensure compliance with sanctions, export controls, and Amcor's own human rights standards?
- How does Amcor ensure transparency and accountability in line with UNGP 21, including through public reporting, disclosure of relevant risk assessments, and meaningful engagement with affected stakeholders and civil society organizations regarding its Russia-related operations and decisions?

**We urge Amcor to immediately suspend and cease all commercial activities in the Russian Federation and to take concrete steps toward a complete and responsible exit from the Russian market.**

We would be pleased to discuss these matters in greater detail and therefore invite you to a meeting. Should you wish to participate in a meeting with Ukrainian and international civil society representatives, please confirm your availability by **March 17, 2026**. Kindly note that after this date, this letter and any responses will be published on the B4Ukraine website.
